Classroom News

As you may know, we have been studying the Democratic Republic of the Congo, formerly, Zaire. We have learned not to call it the Congo as that is a completely separate, neighboring country. Sometimes we call it the DRC. We have learned about the richness of its tropical forests and the fascinating wildlife there. We learned that because the vegetation in a rain forest grows so thickly, the inhabitants of rainforests evolve to be rather small, allowing them to move more effectively through tight spaces. The African elephants are a good example of this as are the Efe Pygmies who rarely grow to be taller than 4 feet. We have a set of cards available to the children that illustrate the ways of the Efe and have descriptions on the back for those children who can read. The cards show how they meet their human needs such as food, shelter, clothing, transportation, art and social structure. We have also focused on the fascinating mountain gorillas and how they meet some of

the same needs. Of course, there's no clothing! When we discussed elephants, Alan contributed an interesting fact, which is that as elephants become elderly, they often starve to death as their teeth have been ground down over the years, rendering them useless. We then discussed how it is nature's way to winnow out the old and the sick, leaving more resources for the young who are more able to populate the species. It is cruel, but one need only look to nature to realize the truth of the Buddhist philosophy that "life is suffering."

Speaking of cruelty and suffering, we have touched upon the terrible violence that has devastated the DRC for so long. All we have shared with the children is that it is currently a very dangerous place for those who live there. There are many valuable minerals below the earth's surface and sadly, people fight over who has the right and might to extract these riches. This greed and desperation are disruptive to every aspect of survival for the Congolese. We have been speaking some French, which is the official language of the DRC and have been singing a beautiful lullaby in Lingala, one of the 200 languages spoken.

That same morning, someone found a dead garter snake. No sooner had we buried them in the garden and lined up to go in when someone saw a live garter snake! We have seen a garter snake nearly every day lately! The children enumerated all the wildlife they encountered that day in our own backyard. They saw birds, snakes, bees, spiders and ants! We were feeling so lucky to share our space with these interesting creatures.

The children know that I love to tell them true stories about my life and I flatter myself that they love hearing them. And they never forget anything! Recently, I told about an owl I had seen and how excited I was because I never see owls. A child contradicted me, though, reminding me of the last time I had encountered owls.

"Don't you remember, Doni, you were taking the trash out and you heard a loud rustle of wings, and stood there with your mouth open while three owls swooped overhead?"

"Oh, yeah," I said.

"I had forgotten all about that time!" I also tell the children many stories about the cats and dogs I encounter at Safehaven Humane Society where I volunteer each week. The happiest stories are about the long-time residents who finally find their forever homes. I get very emotional about these adoptions and the children do as well. We are all united in our best wishes for these innocent animals. It may be a coincidence, but one week when I told them about a wonderful white German shepherd named Balto who had been at the shelter for many months, the children hoped for a good outcome for him and miraculously, he was adopted that week! We were all jubilant. The children are so compassionate, especially towards cute doggies and kitties.

This is my last newsletter for this school year, so I will take this opportunity to thank you for a wonderful year, wish all of you a happy summer break and encourage those of you who are moving on to other ventures to keep in touch and keep supporting Philomath Montessori School!
