Philomath Montessori School February 2015

As I write this, it is the week leading up to the Love of Learning Annual Fundraiser, or "the Auction," as we and the children tend to speak of it. It is much on their minds. As I hung on the wall some artifacts from China, which we are currently studying, several children asked, "Is that for the Auction?"

I think we are pretty well-prepared for our performance. When I was in training, we were told to never have children of this age group perform. Too much stress and pressure. I see that point. I also know that it is the surest way to have parents show up to an event, so there you go. We haven't put the screws to them too much, I believe. Although we have had our issues. A few of our children take exception to being given direction from time to time and then have nothing to offer but grouchy faces and sour dispositions. I tell them, "People do not want to pay \$12 to look at grouchy faces!" We also have had to work hard on our projection. If I think they aren't loud enough, I cup my ear with my hand and that is the signal to increase the volume. But I really think I could go through the entire performance with my hand to my ear! When they make an effort to sing out, it really makes a difference, but somehow I haven't been able to convey that they should be projecting throughout the entire song. Moving fluidly from verse to verse is also a challenge. They want to go into more choruses of "Puff the magic dragon, etc." when I want them to sing the next verse. I created some pictorial cue cards which I hope will help them remember the lyrics. Our biggest train wrecks are when we are not singing in unison. That is really ugly! Then we have to stop and begin again, which

would look really unprofessional! Let's hope it doesn't come to that!

Pauline is outdoors right now presenting to some of the oldest children a timeline of eras from the beginning of time to the present. She prepared a really long rope with the years marked off in hundreds of millions and she is placing signs along its length to mark the names of the eras. I would love to go out and watch the show, but I am minding those children who chose to stay indoors due to lack of interest as well as those sent back indoors due to lack of interest which showed up only after the In preparation for this lesson, I lesson began. presented the Wooden Heirarchical Materials to this group yesterday. In that lesson we are introduced to • the quantities 10,000, 100,000 and 1,000,000 and their written symbols. I told the children that there are many adults who cannot comprehend the idea of a million and how much that really is, but we get to see it right here in our own classroom. At lunch today, I asked Pauline how many millions were in a billion and she answered that there were one thousand millions in a billion. Wow! And there are actual billionaires in the world! It's inconceivable!



Speaking of inconceivable concepts, there have been so many interesting conversations floating around the classroom on some very elevated topics. Kids have been talking about evolution and wondering how, if the first people in the world were in Africa and most likely of dark pigmentation, did there come to be people of paler complexion. I joined in and contributed the idea that this change happened over very long periods of time and over many, many generations. That lead to a discussion of race and genetics and what happens when people who have similar skin tones have a child and what kind of skin that child would have versus the offspring of a couple of differing skin tones. And there has been a lot of talk of marriage here! And it isn't even spring! I overhear who is going to marry whom, how someone is going to marry this one first and then that one later, how boys can marry boys and girls can marry girls....it is rich! Spoken language in the air is the most important language material that we have to offer here and we certainly have an abundance of it!



And now it is in Chinese! Mandarin Chinese, actually. As we study China, it is overwhelming to know what to share. China has such a long history and rich culture that there is so much to choose from. We are blessed with several families with Chinese or Taiwanese heritage and they have been generous in sharing their beautiful artifacts, their knowledge and their language. We have been saying our hellos and good-byes in Mandarin, counting to ten and also singing a children's song. I have a language lesson with Joy Ueng coming up next week and I hope I will find that I haven't massacred the language too badly before I can be corrected. And speaking of correction, I hardly know what to do when I learn a word one way on Google Translate, another way from a Chinese speaking parent and yet another way from a Chinese speaking child! Apparently Mandarin is largely a matter of opinion!

As we learn about China, we are exploring primary traditional religions its – Taoism. Confucianism and Buddhism. I have been greatly helped by a book provided by our library mom, Rachel Brinker. It is "What I Believe" by Alan Brown and Andrew Langley and it has really helped my understanding of the various world religions, which have always fascinated and confounded me. I really benefit from reading children's books on complex topics. They appeal to my short attention span and need for simplification. Hmm, that probably does not reflect well on my overall intellect....

During our Chinese study, Leslie will be providing some relevant art activities for us. We have a scroll upon which to practice making Chinese characters that uses only water and a brush. Then one can watch the letters evaporate. We will also touch on the foodways of China, its extremely diverse yet threatened animal species, its many biomes, the cultivation of rice, Chinese New Year and zodiacal signs, traditional dress, architecture (I am so drawn to the traditional Chinese courtyard), the Great Wall, porcelain and mythical dragons. We learned about the 5 main types of dragons in Chinese culture today – wood, water, fire, metal and earth dragons - each with their own personalities and domains. This sparked the children's imaginations something fierce. They wanted to know what other kinds of dragons there might be - Sand? Rock? Ice? People? Flower? Electricity? My favorite suggestion was that of a Bathtub Dragon! As if bath time weren't challenging enough, now we have to worry about Bathtub Dragons! Clearly, China will provide great depths to explore. I'm sure we will come to the end of our designated time (March 18,

when we switch to Egypt) before we run out of content.

Our Chinese New Year celebration is shaping up nicely, too. Joy Ueng is bringing us some vegetarian dumplings and Lin Li is providing egg rolls. We will eat first thing in the morning while the treats are still warm and fresh. We will sing our song in Chinese ("After School") and then we will go out for a parade around the block or yard with all of our percussion instruments and the dragon puppets some of the kids have made. All this racket and commotion will be sure to frighten away Nian, a mythical beast who eats up the crops, livestock and even people! Nian hates noise and the color red. Fortunately a lot of us will wear red that day. We will send the kids home with haw flake candy provided by the Emschwiller/Wu family and lucky red envelopes containing coins that are a gift to the class from the Uengs! Very exciting! Our celebrations are usually pretty low-key, but this one has developed its own momentum!



As I finish this article it is the Monday after "The Auction." What a wonderful night! I had a great time and so did the kids, evidently. When asked what their favorite part of the night was, we got the following responses: Jai- performing, the gym, the magic show; Kaden – performing on the stage; Jacoby – the gym and the magician; Sariah – the gym and the magic show; Yasmina – the

magician: Lilian- the band: Zavnab – the magician and the face painting; Juniper – the singing; Jaxson – everything; Corvus – playing tag; Ren – playing; James – going to the auction: Mia – cupcakes: Eric everything; Auni - chocolate cupcakes; Ilana - the gym and magic show; Hugo - singing and playing. Harper said, "When we were singing at the auction, my mommy cried happy tears." Pauline said that Harper's mommy was not the only parent crying such tears. I was so pleased and proud of the kids. Several were expressing trepidation about performing at all, but they did agree to stand up on stage with us. All the kids followed directions beautifully and there were no sourpusses in sight!



Meanwhile, life in the classroom goes on. It is so affirming to be part of a system that provides cultural, emotional and physical education along with academic rigor in an atmosphere of choice, where it is a pleasure to learn, where knowledge and new skills are not forced upon children, but rather graciously offered. I have heard it said that the greatest gift of Montessori is that children's souls, quirks and personalities are honored while at the same time they are educated in living harmoniously with others. I only wish that all children could receive such an education.


